## 2013 WINDHOEK HOUSEHOLD WASTE AUDIT RESULTS

AND MUCH MORE

The City of Windhoek is a home to about 16840 businesses.

A job well done to those who came up with different initiatives and innovations that lead to the establishment of those businesses.

It is however disturbing to note that out of the 16840 businesses registered in Windhoek, our records indicate that only 5836 (34.6%) are valid, meaning, operating with valid Certificates of Fitness.

Since the registration of business renewal has been recorded as being conducted at a snail pace; The City of Windhoek has embarked on an extensive information and educational campaign which is aimed at sensitising

the public about the importance of ensuring that businesses operating in Windhoek are operating in accordance with the laws and regulations set.

EMBARKS ON AN EXTENSIVE

ESS RECISTRATION

The above alluded to campaign is a final reminder to the business community and public at large that any person operating or intending to operate a business for gain within the jurisdiction of Windhoek is required by law to register such business activities with the Local Authority.

In terms of applicable legislations, registered businesses are issued with a Certificate of Fitness/Registration in terms of regulation 2(1) and 6 of the regulations relating to the registration

of businesses in conjunction with the provisions of the General Health Regulations.

Those that are operating unlicensed type of businesses should be warned that:

The consequences of operating a business without a valid Certificate of Fitness / Registration, constitutes an offence as it contravenes the legal requirement as stipulated by the law and; Contravention of the provisions of the regulations relating to the registration of a business, carries a penalty of a fine not exceeding N\$ 2000.00 or imprisonment for a period not exceeding six (6) months or both.

It is a civic responsibility of all the business owners to note that, it is not enough to only register your business with the Ministry of Trade and Industry, but if you are conducting your business in Windhoek you are required by law to register your business activity with the City and to renew your registration annually.

If there are businesses that have ceased operations, business owners are required to inform the city in writing.

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
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The City of Windhoek has noted with serious concern the continuous vandalism of the City's facilities including the destruction of graves.

In the past, fewer cases of graves vandalism were recorded, but the recent increase of destructions of graves, especially at Khomasdal and Pioneerspark cemeteries are disturbing.

Graves are regarded as memory sites for the families and relatives of the deceased and for the generations to come.

When these sites are vandalised, it is very traumatic and painful not only to the relatives of the deceased, but to all normal-thinking people, and to the City of Windhoek in particular, since it is the City's responsibility to take care of these facilities for the benefit of all our residents.

Although the City has put security measures in place by contracting the security guards to guard at all cemeteries in the City, it is most unfortunate that the sites are way too big for one to keep an eye on.

It is against that background that the City of Windhoek urges the residents to refrain from vandalism and respect the dead by letting them rest in peace as per the expectations.

The public is equally urged to be vigilant and report any suspicious movement to the law enforcement agencies at 302 302 or to the City Police SMS line 4444.

#### NANNY AND DOMESTIC WORK WORKSHOP



## 2013 WINDHOEK HOUSEHOLD WASTE AUDIT RESULTS

They say you can tell a lot by going through someone's garbage. Research shows that you can tell the person's habits, customs, lifestyle and living standards by looking at the contents of their bins. The bin contains such useful information that even crime has been solved through evidence found in waste. The contents of a bin also reveal environmental awareness or lack thereof as was discovered in the most recent waste audit carried out by our Solid Waste Management division. A waste audit provides data on the amount

and composition of waste aenerated at households across varying income groups. The audit carried out by the City in June 2013 was done with the following objectives in mind:

- to determine the quantity and composition of the waste generated by households within Windhoek utilizing the 240 L wheelie bin:
- determine the effectiveness of the current recycling initiatives identify new opportunities;

gathered information The through the audit assists the City in planning for improved service delivery and in developing initiatives aimed at recyclina more materials from the existing household waste stream thus diverting recyclables from going to landfill.

During the audit, waste from each individual bin sampled was manually sorted into different waste categories, weighed and assessed in terms of how much volume the various components consume in the bin. The audit sample comprised of 1075 bins of which 50% were from low income areas. 23% from middle income and 27% from high income areas. The data generated from the waste audit was then extrapolated to all households in Windhoek supplied with a wheelie bin.

The results of the audit show that the total waste generated at households is 2042 tonnes per month. The rate of waste generation per person per day is estimated to be at 0.56 kg in the high income areas and down to 0.19 kg in the lower income areas.

The total waste composition by weight shows that irrespective of income level, organic food products (including foodleft-overs) is the predominant waste type comprising of 19% of the waste in the bin, followed by the organic garden refuse at 15% and glass at 12% as highlighted in the Figure below.

The content of glass in the low income areas was the highest, which presents a great opportunity for recycling of alass in these areas.

The amount of hazardous material found in the bins is negligible and forms but 0.1% of the total waste stream audited. This is a good indication that residents are cognizant of the importance of correctly disposing of hazardous waste. Electronic waste was also not predominant in the bins, and residents are also commended for this and hereby informed that the City has containers made available at the Kupferberg landfill site, Klein Kuppe transfer station, Brakwater transfer station and at Municipality head offices where residents can dispose

of e-waste free of charge. The City together with Transworld Cargo has an initiative in place for dismantling and recycling some components of e-waste. This will isolate the small hazardous component and allow for the safe disposal thereof while recycling all other usable parts.

The assessment of the recycling program (Clear Bag System) currently in place shows that residents who are recycling are doing so correctly, thus yielding good quality recyclables (cans,

> paper, plastic, glass). The audit also revealed that more effort must be made by residents in areas such as Khomasdal, Otjomuise, Windhoek North and West, Dorado park, Rhino Park, Rocky Crest and Cimbebasia, to recycle in order to decrease the large quantities of recyclables that are currently going to waste. Whereas the clear bag system had been rolled out in these areas, the amount of recyclable collected is disappointedly poor. Recycling is easy, all it requires is for you to separate from your waste stream all the bottles, cans, paper and plastic and to place such in the clear bag provided to you free of charge. On waste removal day, place the clear baa outside and Renta-drum will collect it and provide

you with a brand new clear bag for the following week. Our individual efforts albeit small are significant in preserving the environment and residents are encouraged to recycle if not currently doing so.

The City is working towards an ideal situation where as many recyclables as possible are prevented from going to landfill. This however can only be done with the cooperation of residents and communities of Windhoek. The City therefore appeals to all residents to make use of the recycling initiatives in place and those to be implemented to ensure that we cultivate a culture of REDUCE-REUSE-RECYCLE within Windhoek and in doing so preserve our pristine and beautiful environment for decades to come.
