

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
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

City of Windhoek Political Office Bearers election: A Tale of Unfilled Vacancies

The City of Windhoek held its political office bearers elections on Friday, 1 December 2024. The election saw Councillor Queen Omagano Kamati of SWAPO ascend to the position of Mayor, with NUDO's Councillor Joseph Uapingene stepping into the role of Deputy Mayor.

SWAPO councillors Fransina Kahungu, Sam Shafishuna Nujoma, and Austin Kwenani were elected as members of the Management Committee. However, the election took an unexpected turn when no further nominations were made, leaving two vacancies in the Management Committee unfilled.

The election was initially postponed to 18 January

2024, in hopes of filling the remaining vacancies. Despite the delay, councillors failed to nominate two more members for the Management Committee. As a result, the city remains without a complete Management Committee.

The election has been postponed once again, this time to 8 February 2024. The City is eagerly awaiting the outcome of the next election, hoping for a breakthrough in the current deadlock.

The absence of a full Management Committee poses significant challenges to the governance of the City. The coming weeks will be crucial in determining the future direction of the City of Windhoek's administration.













City of Windhoek receives Affirmative **Action Compliance Certificate**

Mr. Moses Matyayi, the City's CEO, and Mr. Archie Nikanor, the Acting SE for Human Capital, were overjoyed to receive the Affirmative Action Compliance Certificate for the City of Windhoek.

The City of Windhoek has proudly received the Affirmative Action Compliance Certificate for the 2022-2023 period from the Employment Equity Commissioner. This certificate is a testament to the city's commitment to promoting diversity and inclusivity in the workplace.

The certificate is awarded to organizations that comply with the Affirmative Action (Employment) Act, of 1998 (Act No. 29 of 1998). This act requires employers to take proactive measures to ensure equal opportunities for all employees, regardless of their race, gender, or ethnicity. The City of Windhoek has been a leader in this area, implementing several initiatives to ensure that all employees are treated fairly and equitably.

The certificate underscores the importance of promoting diversity and inclusivity in the workplace. According to Mr. Archie Nikanor, the Strategic Executive for Human Capital and Corporate Services, the award serves as a confirmation of the organization's Human Capital Strategy and Policies, which are aimed at ensuring equity, fairness, and organic growth of its employees fall within the category of 'designated groups' and achieving the status of being an 'Employer of Choice'.

The Employment Equity Commission awarded the City of Windhoek an A-Grade Rating, signifying an overall assessment score of 99% compliance in accordance with the Commission's Integrated Review Scorecard (IRSC). However, the Employment Equity Commissioner pointed out that the City of Windhoek's workforce only includes 15 persons with disabilities out of 2497 employees. They encouraged the organization to ensure equitable representation of members, especially people with disabilities.

Fast-Track Cities Initiative: City of Windhoek's Commitment to HIV Prevention

The City of Windhoek recently participated in the Fast-Track Cities 2023 conference, with the aim of learning from other cities and sharing its successes and challenges in combating HIV, tuberculosis, and Hepatitis C (HCV). The conference was hosted by IAPAC in Amsterdam from September 25 to 27, 2023, and was attended by over 700 people from 250 cities and municipalities. The event focused on discussing how cities can accelerate their efforts to

end the HIV, tuberculosis, and HCV epidemics by 2030, in line with the New Urban Agenda and the Paris Declaration on Fast-Track Cities Ending the HIV Epidemic.

Ms. Nivea Kwenani, the Section Head for Health Promotion and the City of Windhoek's Fast-Track Cities project coordinator, attended the conference at the invitation of the project's main partners, UNAIDS and IAPAC. Namibian delegates at the conference included representatives from UNAIDS, IAPAC, the City of Windhoek, and the Youth Empowerment Group (YEG), who participated in the conference sessions and e-poster presentations, sharing their experiences and insights.

Twenty mayors and elected officials attended the conference, reaffirming their commitment to eradicating these diseases and addressing the political and social determinants of health. The event provided a forum for the exchange of innovative approaches and solutions used in various urban settings to combat HIV, tuberculosis, and HCV while also eliminating

health disparities.

The conference discussed the progress and challenges of the Fast-Track Cities project in assisting cities to implement evidencebased interventions and policies. It featured presentations and discussions on a range of HIV, tuberculosis, and HCV topics, including prevention, testing, treatment, care, stigma reduction, human rights, social justice, and community engagement. The conference also focused on how city public health leadership can contribute to achieving the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) for HIV, tuberculosis, and HCV, specifically SDGs 3.3, 10, and 11.

The City of Windhoek's Health and Environment Services Division supports the Fast-Track Cities Initiative and is expanding its HIV prevention response program through partnerships, evidencebased strategies, and prioritizing key populations. Working with key stakeholders, the City of Windhoek aims to meet the 95-95-95 taraets while also creating a healthier, more resilient city.













The City of Windhoek receives innovation hubs from NUST

The collaboration between the City of Windhoek and the Namibian University of Science and Technology (NUST) has reached a new milestone with the official handover of three offices located on the 2nd floor of the High-Tech Transfer Plaza Select (HTTPS) building. These offices will serve as a dedicated space for fostering innovation and implementing ideas that benefit the City's customers.

The handover took place in December 2023 and is part of the existing partnership outlined in the Memorandum of Understanding signed between the two institutions. NUST Deputy Vice Chancellor for

Finance and Operations, Miriam Dikua, emphasized the importance of having a stimulating environment to generate solutions for contemporary challenges. She noted that the City is a key partner, having accommodated 400-500 NUST students as interns, and expressed expectations for the partnership to expand in the future.

Moses Matyayi, the Chief Executive Officer of the City of Windhoek, highlighted the City's role as the largest local authority in the country and the need to set the tone for technological and digital solutions. Matyayi emphasized that the City caters to a diverse range of stakeholders, from academia to government institutions, and stressed the importance of addressing the specific needs of these customers. He said the newly allocated offices will be a space where technology flourishes, innovation is nurtured, and ideas are turned into reality.

The CEO acknowledged the global shift towards the 4th industrial revolution and emphasized the City's commitment to being part of this transformative wave. The CEO sees the newly acquired offices as instrumental in helping the City achieve its goals in adapting to the technological advancements of the modern era.

The HTTPS building, where the offices are located, is a state-of-the-art innovative hub that provides innovators with access to network experts, the latest technologies, and a collaborative space for working together and exchanging ideas. The facility is equipped with technologically advanced video conferencing rooms and presentation spaces, creating an environment conducive to productive work and collaboration.














Candle usage made safer with 'Safety **Candle Lights'**

Shack fires are a serious problem in Namibia. They affect many people who live in shacks and use fire sources like candles for lighting. Sometimes, these candles are left unattended or mishandled, causing fires that lead to homelessness, forced relocation, and loss of property.

Mr. Fox Voigts, a resident of Windhoek, decided to create a safer alternative to using candles in shacks. He was motivated by a personal experience of a colleague whose shack was damaged by a candle fire. Mr. Voigts invented a simple and safe device that he calls the Safety Candlelight.

To make a Safety Candlelight, you need the following items:

- A glass jar (such as a jam jar)
- A mop frame (from the old model types)
- A piece of wire
- A candle

The steps are as follows:

1. Cut the candle into three equal parts.

The material needed to DIY the safety candle.

- 2. Insert one part of the candle into the mop frame (as if you were attaching a mop stick to it).
- 3. Tie a wire to the bottom of the mop frame and extend it to the top, so that it is slightly longer than the candle (this will allow you to hold the device without burning your hand).
- 4. Put the whole assembly into the glass jar (this will prevent the candle flame from spreading).

He has made several safety


candlelights and distributed them to his friends, who have appreciated their effectiveness and convenience. The Safety candlelights are not only easy to make but are also affordable. He indicated that besides the candles, the other materials can be obtained for free from dumpsites or discarded items at home. He also urges people who use candles in shacks to be very careful and to take extra measures to prevent fires. He says that his goal is to help people be safe, feel safe, and have peace of mind.



City of Windhoek's pre-paid electricity meter updating progressing well

The City of Windhoek continues to make significant strides in the implementation of the Token Identifier (TID) rollover project. As of 8 January 2024, the city has successfully converted 21,914 of its 56,557 prepayment meters (PPM), marking a completion rate of 38.74%.

The TID rollover project is a global initiative necessitated by the impending expiry of the software that runs prepaid meters worldwide on 24 November 2024. The TID is used to determine if a token has already been used in a prepayment meter. After the deadline, all pre-paid meters must be updated by entering two special tokens. Failure to do so will result in the meters not accepting new credit tokens, leaving customers without water or electricity.

The City of Windhoek began the TID key change exercise in the Prosperita suburb and has since expanded to other areas. Out of the 25 suburbs in the City of Windhoek, 15 have been completed, which translates to 60% of the total suburbs. The current rate of the TID rollover progress is 200 PPM per day including weekends, which will ensure the Council converts all PPMs by the planned date of end June 2024.

Despite facing challenges such as network communication failures, access refusal, and lack of awareness among customers, the City of Windhoek has managed to maintain the pace of the project. The performance has doubled with the return of all team members after the festive season.

As the deadline approaches, the City of Windhoek is working hard to ensure a smooth transition for all its prepaid utility customers. As a result, the City urges all customers who have electricity pre-payment meters to cooperate and allow TID Rollover Field Officers access to upgrade their meters. These officers, identifiable by their CoW-branded Personal Protective Clothing and official identity cards, perform their duties per suburb every Monday through Friday between 08:00 and 19:00, with weekend operations taking place between 08:00 and 16:30.

The City's commitment to this project demonstrates its dedication to ensuring that no customer is left in the dark, and the City is working hard to complete the TID rollover project successfully.



Navigating Water Supply Challenges: An update from NamWater and City of Windhoek on Central Namibia's Water Supply

NamWater in collaboration with the City of Windhoek (CoW) issued a joint media release updating the consumers regarding the current water supply situation in the Central Area of Namibia (CAN).

The Central Area of Namibia depends on an integrated water supply system derived from Omatako, Von Bach, and Swakoppoort dams, supplemented by the Karst Aquifer, Windhoek Aquifer, and New Goreangab Water Reclamation Plant. Despite facing challenging conditions,

this integrated system has successfully ensured an uninterrupted water supply even during dry seasons.

Our team of experts consistently assesses water supply security, leading to the adoption of strategies during the 2023 stakeholders' workshop. Unfortunately, the ongoing dry spell, coupled with increased water consumption, challenges these strategies.

As of 22 January 2024, the dams' combined water level is at 22.2%, compared to 39.9% in 2023. Given these circumstances, breaching two rainy seasons may be unlikely, posing potential repercussions for water supply in the CAN.

We urge stakeholders to adhere to Water Demand Management measures, as further measures may become necessary. Rest assured, NamWater and CoW are committed to monitoring the situation and taking every step to secure water supply to the CAN. Your cooperation is crucial in navigating these challenges.

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

How to report an incident.

Message format:

- A fee of N\$0.40 for each SMS sent applies.
- 160 characters per SMS.

The message should contain the below:

- Type of incident (water leak, pipe burst, overflowing sewer or power outage etc.)
- Erf or gate number
- Street name
- Suburb / location

CONCERNS ABOUT OESTROGEN LEVELS IN WINDHOEK WATER

4 January 2024

The social media post "Oestrogen in Windhoek water leads to rise in HOMOSEXUALITY" is misleading and inaccurate. Windhoek has been a global leader in water reclamation for more than five decades, ensuring the highest standards of water quality and safety.

The Gammams Water Care Works Wastewater Treatment Plant (GWCW WWTP) employs a rigorous approach, utilizing mechanical, physical, and biological treatments to elevate water reuse. The New Goreanaab Water Reclamation Plant (NGWRP) also employs advanced multiple-barrier technology, guaranteeing top-tier drinking water quality.

The city's water safety relies on four pillars:

- 1. GWCW WWTP optimization
- 2. NGWRP's multiple-barrier treatment
- 3. Monitoring via an accredited laboratory
- 4. Blending reclaimed water with surface and underground sources.

Scientific Services, the city's accredited lab, diligently analyzes parameters like Endocrine Disrupting Chemicals (EDCs), including oestrogen forms like Estrone and Estradiol. The data indicates a remarkable 95% reduction in Estradiol levels during GWCW WWTP treatment, followed by a further 50% decrease via NGWRP processes, resulting in a final water concentration of 6 pg/ml.

This efficiency is outlined in the table below:

Point	Estradiol (pg/ml)	% removal
GWCW WWTP Inlet	231	-
GWCW WWTP Effluent	12	95
NGWRP Final	06	50

Notes:

- 1. pg(picograms) = 1x10-12 grams.
- 2. The acceptable daily intake (ADI) for Estradiol hasn't been universally established, but the general long-term ingestion limit is 1.7 μ g/l (1 700 000 pg/l).
- 3. Estradiol is found in various water types and occurs naturally in some foods.
- 4. The city's drinking water meets safety standards, with Estradiol levels posing no risk of endocrine disruptions.

The drinking water in Windhoek meets the World Health Organization's standards for oestrogen levels and does not pose any health risk to the population. Oestrogen in water has no scientific link to sexual orientation or behavior. While it is understandable that people may have worries about oestrogen's effects, they can trust that Windhoek's water treatment is effective and ensures that their drinking water does not contain levels of oestrogen that could lead to the alleged health effects of feminization or infertility

PUBLIC NOTICE Beware of Electricity Meter Fraud

18 January 2024

The City of Windhoek has noticed a concerning trend of fraudsters who are posing as City officials and offering customers the chance to bypass their electricity meters in exchange for a fee. This is a fraudulent scheme and we urge the public to be vigilant and not fall for it. Our staff are responsible for ensuring that all meter points are correctly metered and that the Council receives its due revenue.

Customers who participate in such activities are breaking the law and will face legal consequences. It is a serious crime to bypass electricity, tamper with an electricity meter, or connect to an illegal electricity source. The minimum penalty for this offence is N\$16,000.00 which can also lead to a criminal case being laid against the culprit.

If you suspect that someone has interfered with your electricity meter, please contact the Customer Contact Centre at 061 290 3777. You can also report any illegal electricity connections to the City Police at 061 302 302 or SMS 4444.

This service allows you to submit your monthly water / electricity meter reading via SMS. Below is the information on how to register and submit your reading.

1. Registration

You will be required to register your cell phone number to an Account by sending an SMS with your account number and statement key to 269600. Please note, only one registration per Account is allowed but a single mobile phone can register to more than one Account.

Your SMS should look like this: **EXAMPLE**

2. Reading Submission

Once your cell phone number is registered to an Account, you are eligible to submit your monthly reading by sending an SMS to 269600. Send separate SMSes for water & electricity readings.

Your SMS should look like this: **EXAMPLE**

mread (space) MeterNo*Reading send to 269600



Send To: 269600 mread XYZ123*100

The Meter Number will be indicated on your statement. The reading to submit must be collected from your meter at home. Please note that only one reading per month will be accepted.

How to read your electricity meter



Read only the 5 white digits

How to take your water reading



Read only the first 4 black digits

A FEE OF N\$0,40 WILL BE CHARGED PER SMS.

READINGS TO BE TAKEN AND SUBMITTED BETWEEN 20TH AND 31ST OF EVERY MONTH.

E-MAIL SELF-READINGS AND FAX READINGS WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED

The City of Windhoek is experiencing challenges in accessing some properties to take meter readings. Clients are however encouraged to register and submit readings via sms.
